GWI Fee Increase

With her permission, I am copying the message that Bev Rhodes put in the CFUW Scarborough Newsletter by way of explanation of the whole Graduate Women International (GWI) Fee increase question. Bev understands the situation so well and writes about it so clearly.

"On the international scene, in view of the state of GWI's finances, the national board of CFUW has taken legal advice regarding action it might take with respect to continuing membership in GWI. An additional factor is the matter of the dues increase, which does not have a place in CFUW's 2017-18 budget. Technically, the portion of the increase that would have been due at the beginning of 2017 is now due, in addition to dues at the new level. However, the amount approved for payment at the AGM in Richmond is equal to the total of the amounts paid in January and March 2017 – an amount substantially less than the amount expected by GWI.

As you are no doubt aware, the motion to leave GWI that was presented at the 2016 and the 2017 AGM received a majority of the votes cast both years, but not the two-thirds required for the motion to pass. The dues situation may decide the matter, as GWI's by-laws require that the payment of dues must be up-to-date for membership to remain in good standing. Stay tuned!"

PAST EVENTS Bhutan: Land of Happiness




On January 17th a large, interested group of members and visitors enjoyed a fascinating presentation on Bhutan by Marianne Anderson and her friend Leslie White.
Leslie, a professional

photographer with a business of her own creating photo travel books, impressed us all with her captivating photos of this unknown gem.

A small country of 600 thousand in the eastern Himalayas, Bhutan is surrounded by India, Tibet, and China. Valleys at 10 thousand feet and mountain peaks at 28 thousand feet provide diverse, spectacular scenery, and Buddhist Monasteries and Dzongs or Fortresses in 15th century style dominate the countryside. There is a strong sense of culture and tradition with a National Dress code. The country is now ruled by a Constitutional Monarchy after a century of the Absolute Rule of Kings. It is felt here that Gross National Happiness is a better ideal of well-being than (GDP) Gross Domestic Policy.



Speaker Series January 20

CFUW promotes equality, social justice, fellowship and lifelong learning for women and girls. Their speaker series on January 20 coincided with a Women's March at Nathan Phillips Square and 37 other marches in Canada hoping to inspire "advancement of women" across the country. I was so pleased to attend.

Sandy Thomson, who introduced the day, outlined three ways to become involved in making a difference through Activism, Advocacy or Craftivism. Briefly, the definition of the third term is to bring positive change via personalized activism. So, the stage was set for the day.

Next, Maya Roy, multilingual CEO of the YWCA, suggested attending meetings and writing letters including a policy statement in preparation for the next election. There are many issues: affordable housing, women in shelters, poverty, drugs, how to make digital technology safe for girls, childcare, education, and indigenous rights. Maya suggested that a key to achieving success is to predetermine WHAT IS OUR ASK? She suggests being INCLUSIVE, not DIVISIVE and adds that when it comes to politicians, not to hesitate to approach someone of a different opinion.

Christine Corso from People for Education, talked about their mission to strengthen our universal public education system and graduate all young people. Many charts and funding amounts were given to illustrate the strength and weaknesses of public education. Pros and cons of resources, our school goals versus the global society, streaming, school closings were among the issues discussed.

When the day ended, the participants from all over Ontario had much to contemplate and focus on, all the while remembering Maya Roy's words: "Dynamic women can make a difference".

Concerns about the Faculty Club's proposed changes to our membership status, galvanized our members who turned out in large number to make their voices heard by engaging in a democratic process.

An articulate and comprehensive summary of our concerns was delivered by Marianne Anderson, with input and moral support from others. (See her summary below) The Faculty Club Board decided to postpone any immediate decision and they plan to consider the issue further with broader consultation and with the expectation that a fair resolution can be found.

Faculty Club AGM Synopsis

On January 24, 2018, the Faculty Club held its

Annual Meeting. Among other items, the Faculty Club was proposing updating its by-laws, which included implications for Membership categories. The proposal was to create one Membership category, which would only include current and retired Faculty and Staff at U of T. Others, including alumni and UWC members would become Patrons and would no longer have a vote nor access to Annual Meetings at the Faculty Club. Several members of the UWC expressed concern about these changes. We want to keep the right to vote and also did not know the implications to other member privileges (including reciprocal club agreements, membership lounge, priority access to rooms etc.) as well as fees. At the Annual Meeting, we raised our concerns and the Faculty Club agreed to postpone the vote on the by-law change to allow for further discussion. A Special Meeting of the Faculty Club will be held within 90 days with, we hope, a revised by-law. We will keep you informed of future developments, which may include encouraging UWC members to come out and vote at the Special Meeting.
