## Reflecting on 29 years of valuing and supporting the education of women



I joined the UWC twentynine years ago at 162 St. George St. It had a homelike atmosphere in a traditional setting. It was an opportunity

to be active in study groups, listen to interesting speakers and take part in meaningful conversation. There was the chance to be on committees, take leadership roles, and use one's skills to serve the Club. I wanted to be associated with like-minded women who celebrated education for women.

My favourite activities are many. For three decades I have attended the Evening Book Group where I made friends with a common love of reading and discussion. I liked serving on the Graduates Committee, which looked after the interior of the St. George building. My passion for interior decorating and architecture were put to good use.

On the Board I took part in important discussions on the running of the Club. The Finance Committee, where the monetary decisions were made, also attracted me. There were special holiday activities at Easter, Mother's Day and Christmas. In the earlier years there was a Fall Fair where everybody worked together. BBQs on the deck in the summer were popular. Most recently I took bridge lessons and played with some formidable players.

My career took place at U of T in Mississauga where I taught in the Dept. of Mathematics for 29 years. My key interest was Calculus and in the latter years I was responsible for the large first year course in Calculus. I was honoured with the Faculty Teaching Award in 1993-94. My



memories of colleagues and students are precious.

One of the changes I saw in the Club was the reduction in the number of members. I am delighted to note that our membership is increasing with vibrant, capable women with many degrees. We can now focus on continued learning and helping others. In the later years at St. George we were using much of our energy to maintain our building.

In the future we can look forward to harnessing women's energy to continue to be a beacon for women who value and support the education of women. With the privilege of a higher education we are equipped to use it for the good of others. With regular meetings and activities we have the opportunity to encourage one another and to mentor those who need it. Our members will join for the joy of giving their time and talents for others.

#### **CFUW Update**

#### **CFUW Ontario Recognizes our Charitable Activities**

At the CFUW Ontario Council meeting in Oshawa on May 12, we received an Ontario Council Recognition award for Community Involvement for working with three community organizations: Romero House, Sistering and Indspire.

The theme of the meeting was Empowering Women and Girls through STEM (Scientist, Technologist, Engineer, Mathematician.) Keynote Speaker Dr. Imogen Coe, Dean of the Faculty of Science at Ryerson, spoke on Embedding Equity, Delivering Diversity, Saving Science, stressing the need to hear many different voices as a means of enhancing scientific research.

Afternoon Speaker Cindy Adams, spoke about *Science in the schools*, noting it's importance because less than 50% of Canadian high school students complete grade 11 or 12 science, while 80% of the fee is paid for by schools, and the budget is \$6 million.
