The CanLit Boom of the 60s

Professor Mount is a nationally recognized student and teacher of Canadian literature.

In 2005, his doctoral dissertation became a prize-winning book: *When Canadian Literature Moved to New York* (UTP, 2005).

His most recent book *Arrival: The Story of CanLit* (Anansi, 2017), chronicles the boom that took place in Canadian publishing in the later half of the 20th-century, setting it into a national and international context.This book was named best book of the year by the Globe & Mail and National Post.

Nick Mount has won numerous awards, most recently the 3M National Teaching Fellowship, the country's highest teaching award (2011).

All funds raised will go to the UWC (Toronto) Foundation for scholarships and charitable giving.



By the time you are reading this, the Scholarship Committee will have deliberated and awarded our 6 UWC Toronto scholarships of \$4000.00 each, as well as the Mary Macdonald Scholarship of \$25,000.00 (over 4 years) to one of 3 former City of York schools. We will be hosting a reception for the successful candidates and a school representative at the Faculty Club sometime in late June. Stay tuned for recipients' names, schools and short bios as well as pictures in our next newsletter. Committee members will attend and present these scholarships on behalf of the UWC Toronto at the convocation ceremonies of the successful recipients. At this time, I would like to take the opportunity to thank the committee members for their hard work and commitment during our first year of this new process. We created criteria, the application letter and form, and decided on award amounts and eligible schools. We visited each school involved, developing a more personal relationship with these face-to-face meetings. Follow-up contact was made to ensure all schools were on track. The most challenging task was the selection process with every submission worthy of merit.

We look forward to revisiting and refining our process for the 2019- 2020 school year.

Ana Bailão, Deputy Mayor of Toronto, arrived at the Faculty Club on Friday night to help us open the 40th Anniversary Celebration of the CFUW, Ontario Conference to a packed room of delegates coming from all over Ontario. As an immigrant to Canada at the age of fifteen, unable to speak English, she can empathize with women who are struggling to gain a foothold in Canada. Her words were inspiring and gave a shining example of what could be achieved through integrity and hard work.







The next morning, we were again given an inspiring glimpse into the life of yet another determined woman.

Our Former Premier, Kathleen Wynne, held the audience in rapt attention from the moment she stepped up to the microphone as she related her life story, with all its peaks and valleys, in humble yet impressive words that everyone could relate to. As she concluded, the audience jumped to their feet to give her a standing ovation. With the presentation of three very interesting workshops on Saturday afternoon and delicious food served by the Faculty Club, the delegates left happy and ready to take their enthusiasm back to their home clubs.

Experiences of Refugee Women Through Education

Mary Jo Leddy of Romero House invited two young women to present their personal stories. The girls and their families had made their way through several other countries before arriving in Canada. One student who has refugee status has been accepted at U. of T but has to wait 12 – 18 months for permanent resident status. Without this status she can't apply for scholarships. The other student and her parents are journalists who have to learn English, wait for their June refugee status hearing, and then face the challenge of finding jobs. The refugee process requires a lawyer, and any cuts in Legal Aid funding are devastating.

Book Clubs in Prisons

Rev. Dr. Carol Finlay, founder of Book Clubs for Inmates, spoke with compassion about the prisoners she's met. She noted that most come from low socio-economic strata of society, and as many as 75% from violent, abusive homes. One in ten will have a visitor, and in many instances only once a year, possibly due to the high cost of travel.

Female inmates have a more difficult time with incarceration than males. Women will have lost their children, and may have difficulty getting them back when released because of problems in finding appropriate housing and jobs.

The book clubs develop communities around books. Prisoners are encouraged to speak freely and learn to articulate. They begin to feel that they are worthy of respect.

There are about 35 book clubs in federal penitentiaries across Canada, and currently there are 130 volunteers. Each is expected to make a two-year commitment but most stay longer, finding the experience highly positive and enriching. The participants are very grateful.

Continuing Education in the Jane Finch Area

Talisha Ramsaroop, Community Projects Coordinator at York University (and also a member of our club) led a fascinating discussion on "Continuing Education in the Jane-Finch Area." Her panel included three impressive young women who spoke about the challenges and opportunities in their education. Suzanne is pursuing her PhD, Zenitha is deciding between multiple university offers for the fall and Cicely is still in high school.

Talisha started the conversation with the question "What does equitable education mean to you?"

The panel shared their experiences, discussing the importance of higher expectations within the school culture, avoiding pre-mature streaming to applied courses, the critical role of guidance personnel and information resources on extracurricular and post secondary opportunities, and the importance of strong family support. It was a very interesting and informative session with everyone so impressed by the articulate and

enthusiastic words of these young women.




