#### ZOOM SPEAKERS KATE CHUNG AND THEA KURDI JUNE 13 AT 5:00 PM

Kate Chung is the Toronto-based Chair of the Housing Committee of the Older Women's Network and Co-Chair of Accessible Housina Network, a collaboration of nonprofit Canadian organizations, advocating in support of people of all ages to live as they wish, in housing that is fully accessible. Thea Kurdi is the President of DesignABLE Environments. She is an affiliate member of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada and a Certified Professional in Accessible Built Environments, with over 20 years experience in barrierfree and universal design for architectural projects.

On June 13, 2022, Kate and Thea will bring together their perspectives as community activist and architectural planner in their presentation, "The Crisis in Accessible Housing – For All of Us". They will include their postelection take on the results of the June 2 Ontario election and what those results will mean for seniors and people with disabilities – in effect, all of us as we eventually experience temporary or permanent disabilities ourselves.

Meanwhile, as the June 2 Ontario election approaches, Kate and her colleagues at Accessible Housing Network would like to insure that the issue of accessible housing is front and centre. They urge us to let our MPP's know that now is the time for government to commit to accessible housing, not just affordable housing.

There is a flurry of activity at UWC with the club's Annual General Meeting (AGM) only days away! The meeting will be held on Monday, May 30 in-person at The Faculty Club. As I write this article, the Scholarship Committee is very busy reviewing the applications received from 9 schools for 6 scholarships of \$5,000 each and the applications received from three other schools for 1 scholarship of \$25,000 which is paid over four years. There is a limited amount of time for committee members to review the applications and submit their choices for the students who they believe are most deserving of the scholarships based on certain criteria before the committee meets on May 26 to make the final decisions. The scholarship winners will be announced on May 26 and the next day all applicants will be notified and invitations will be sent to the successful applicants to attend the Scholarship Reception which will be held just 2 ½ weeks later, on June 15, at The Faculty Club. 
#### **CONDOLENCES**

#### THE IMPORTANCE OF STEM

Perhaps 20 years ago, the provincial government allowed the removal of two subject areas from its list of compulsory subjects. Henceforth, grade 11 & 12 mathematics and science courses, were no longer required for graduation and entrance to university.

Removing senior level courses from the list of compulsory subjects, indicated these courses were unimportant. Unfortunately, many students arrived at university to find they could not enter STEM courses, without those credits. Many women lacked the qualifications necessary to enter "non-traditional" fields, thus perpetuating the myth that science and mathematics were fields dominated by men, who merited the higher incomes they earned on graduation.

The health of our planet then rested with climate deniers, who lacked the knowledge necessary for a deeper understanding of the mechanics and issues of climate change: vaccinations, wildfires, flooding, heat waves, pandemics.





How does one effectively study climate change without knowledge of the chemical interaction between carbon and hydrocarbon molecules, or the importance of physics for understanding thermodynamics, and melting sea ice, or the calculations in statistical gathering? In a democracy, one's vote is supposed to represent one's free, informed consent to government decisions on issues of the day, but can one vote intelligently, without a background in science and mathematics?

It is time to realize that involvement in the vast decisionmaking processes around climate change, means all students need to study these subjects, and to apply what they have learned, to the democratic process. Until there is an alternative, every Ontario school board should use WHMIS type programmes and NGOs to teach staff, administrators, and teachers about climate change, to fill knowledge gaps of the last 20 years. In a climate emergency, there's no time to waste.




#### PILATES | TUESDAYS AT 9:00 AM

#### **ZOOM SPEAKER AMANDA BITTNER | MAY 16**

Our guest Zoom speaker on May 16 was Professor Amanda Bittner, a political psychologist, author and researcher who teaches at Memorial University in Newfoundland. In "Polarization of Politics and Voters' Perceptions of Party Leaders", Amanda led listeners through the fascinating research that she has been conducting on how voters

in Canada, the U.S., Britain, Australia and New Zealand perceive political leaders and how those leaders are evaluated by the public on the basis of character and competence. Amanda explained that while sometimes the results of her research are unexpected, one reliable trend in recent years is clear: people who are "partisans" in support of a particular party or set of policies are becoming increasingly polarized about party leaders. A lively discussion about this trend followed Amanda's talk, with Zoom participants observing how the trend applies to recent political leaders in Canadian and the U.S.
