Dianne Saxe is a Canadian lawyer and politician who was elected in 2022 to represent University-Rosedale on Toronto City Council. She studied law at Osgoode Hall Law School, earning a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) in 1974. She was called to the bar in 1976 and earned a Ph.D. in law from Osgoode in 1991.

Before entering politics, she practised environmental law and served as the last environmental commissioner of Ontario from 2015 to 2019. She was deputy leader of the Green Party of Ontario from 2020 to 2022.

We'll be meeting in a lovely grand hall at St Paul's Bloor Street Church, 227 Bloor Street East. Lunch will begin at 12 noon, catered by St Paul's excellent kitchen, and offering a choice of salmon, chicken or vegetarian dish, plus gluten free dessert, tea or coffee. The cost is \$60.00.

SPEAKER: JACQUELINE GIBBONS | MONDAY, MARCH 13 AT 5:30 PM





Jacqueline A. Gibbons is an ethnographer, author, cultural sociologist and Professor Emeritus in the Department of Sociology at York University in Toronto. Jacqueline's interests in human imagination, challenge and creativity have led her around the world to research projects in Australia, Egypt, Japan and India, and have resulted in numerous publications.

Her most recent book, Spread Your Wings: lcarus to 1912, tells a tale of courageous explorers, inventors, pilots and entrepreneurs who set the scene for mankind's landings on Mars and beyond.

Jacqueline's talk will explore thoughtprovoking themes about flight contained in her book and in particular will emphasize women's contributions to the history of flight.

Join us at the Faculty Club on Monday, March 13 for what promises to be a fascinating talk by one of our own UWC members, Jacqueline Gibbons, entitled "Women, Wings & Wizardry". Women have been flying since the beginning of time in mythic, folk and religious contexts. They became famous balloonists during the Napoleonic era, and later excelled as pioneer airship and airplane pilots before the First World War. Jacqueline will illustrate her talk with images drawn from her recent book: Spread Your Wings: Icarus to 1912.

The talk will be free to members of the Faculty Club; non-Faculty Club members are asked to pay an event fee of \$13.00 (which includes HST and the Faculty Club's service charge) by credit card at the door.

Our club is fortunate to account among its members some of Canada's most eminent scientists.

"Children all over the world have reason to be grateful to Dr. Leone Farrell for her work on poliomyelitis vaccine. In applying earlier techniques, she devised a new method that proved essential for virus elimination, producing a more effective vaccine and making possible rapid, large-scale production. According to one of her colleagues, her method should have been known as the "Farrell Method", or at least, as the Connaught Method. It contributed to the success of the Connaught Laboratories because they were the only company outside the United States to hold a United States license for manufacturing poliomyelitis vaccine."



New members are always welcome. Just click on the RSVP link that Haley sends out each Friday, and we'll gladly send you the articles we'll be discussing that week.





For those who like to read ahead, our next books are:


April 24: The Maid by Nita Prose

A memoir of a Newfoundland childhood and the raucous, terrible, amazing journey to becoming a novelist.





SPEAKER ADAM BUNCH | FEBRUARY 13

Members attending UWC's speaker event on February 13 were treated to a fascinating talk by local historian and author, Adam Bunch. Taking pages from his recent book, *The Toronto Book of Love*, as a starting point, Adam regaled his audience with true stories of love, romance, marriage and heartbreak from Toronto's past. Interesting and often amusing slides of old portraits, photographs and maps accompanied Adam's lively storytelling.

He acquainted us with astonishing facts from the lives of prominent residents as our city evolved from strait-laced Town of York to the lively and diverse City of Toronto that it is today. We met personalities such as John Graves Simcoe (and his pyromaniac wife!), and the scandal-ridden family of Chief Justice William Powell and his formidable spouse, Anne Murray Powell. Adam helped us see that the delights and tragic entanglements brought by love, fidelity, loss and heartbreak are repeated throughout all periods of our human history, no matter the era, social status or political power of those involved.
