Directors' MESSAGE

The end of 2023 is upon us. It is always a time to reflect on the year. I hope members were able to enjoy events coordinated by the UWCT and had the opportunity to meet some likeminded women.

Personally, I enjoy so many of our club's activities - bridge, French conversation, book club, speakers and various cultural outings. (My mother used to call me "Judy Joiner"). But I feel most rewarded by my involvement in the Scholarship Committee and our Foundation. It makes me so proud that our club can make such a big impact.

Our Foundation awarded scholarships of \$6,000 each to nine incredible women headed off to university from the 17 Toronto high schools we work with. We also provide scholarships to women at Inukshuk H.S. in Iqaluit, two candidates at the Children's Aid Foundation and a residence scholarship at Innis College.

The Foundation is generously supported by our Club (through the income on our investments), but we also need the support of our individual members. Last year, we set an aggressive goal to raise \$20,000 (in part because of a very generous early donation by Mary Aziz) and in 2022, we ended up raising \$25,202!

So, this year, we are setting our fundraising goal at \$25,000, but hope to do even better. Please consider giving. As well as a monetary goal, we really want ALL of our members to feel involved.

As part of estate planning or end of year tax planning, some people may want to consider a share donation. We would be happy to give you more information on how to do this. For others, it may be as simple as a quick etransfer – any amount it most appreciated and tax receipts will be issued.

Together, we can make a huge impact in the lives of these scholarship recipients. These young women are so deserving and destined for great things. We can help give them the higher education they need to guide their future paths in these uncertain times.

I am looking forward to seeing many of you at our Festive Dinner on December 12th and wishing everyone a happy holiday season with friends/family/pets and a special hope for peace in 2024.

NATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE DECEMBER 6TH AT 12:30 PM

On Wednesday, December 6, 2023, from 12:30–2:20 PM, the University of Toronto will join communities across Canada for the National Day of Remembrance and Action for Violence Against Women (NDRAVAW) to honour the lives of the 14 women killed in a devastating act of misogyny at Montreal's École Polytechnique in 1989. We'll hear from both the Faculty of Applied Science & Engineering on the legacy of December 6, 1989, and from our keynote speaker on the rise in transmisogyny and violence against queer and trans women globally. In addition, there will be a musical tribute, poetry, and an awards ceremony recognizing individuals who've shown a commitment to ending gender-based violence.

The event is being hosted at Hart House in the Great Hall (7 Hart House Cir, Toronto, ON M5S 3H3), and lunch will be provided. We're asking guests to arrive between 11:30 am and 12 pm to sign-in.

Doris Geddes has been a member of the UWC Toronto since 1989, and through the years has been active on the board, the finance committee, evening book group, bridge, the UWC Foundation, scholarship committee, and attended many dinners and speakers. She also was president of the committee responsible for 162 St. George St. - the building and contents - and was involved with its sale.

Doris was the first and only female lecturer in the math department, when the University of Toronto Mississauga (formerly Erindale College) opened its doors in 1967. In the beginning, Doris had a little office under the stairs, due to a shortage of space.

Her first year calculus class started with 50 students and ended with 700! It's no wonder she won the faculty teaching award, the first ever given to a member of the math department!

Service to others has also been important to Doris. She was married to a United Church Minister for 22 years, serving in Manitoba, Alberta and Ontario; was church treasurer; was on the founding board of the Neighbourhood Centre; and has been president of Zonta of Toronto. Doris has travelled widely – 55 countries on 5 continents – and enjoys photography, reading and classical music.



We are very excited to be offering a "Learn Bridge in a Day" course on Thursday, Feb 1, 2023, at the U. of T. Faculty Club. We have had many inquiries about offering bridge lessons, and think this is the perfect way for new players to "test the waters".

The game of bridge has taken the world by storm. Everyone seems to be wanting to learn this wonderful game that is an aid to maintaining brain health and delaying the onset of dementia. It is a very social game that you can play anywhere in the world. Once you've learned to play bridge, you will never be bored again, and will always have something to do.

We are very lucky to have the award-winning teacher, Josée Hamill, teaching this class. She will teach you the basics of bridge, in this interactive class that has both instruction and coached play.

The class will be approximately 5 hours long, including a break for lunch. The cost is \$60, which includes a copy of Barbara Seagram's Bridge Basics book. If you are not a member of the Faculty Club, the cost will be \$73. Lunch will be available for purchase in the Faculty Club Dining Room.

This course is ideal for anyone who would like to learn bridge but isn't sure where to start. It is also perfect for anyone who would prefer to not make a large commitment of time. Once you complete this course, you will have an understanding of bridge bidding, scoring and the mechanics of play.




January 4: The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

Esme's mother died giving her birth, so she is brought up by her father. She spends her childhood under the table in the Scriptorium, where James Murray and his team of lexicographers, including her father, are compiling the Oxford English Dictionary. Over time she discovers that words in common use, particularly those used by and about women, are not included. Williams writes that her novel began as two simple questions. Do words mean different things to men and women? And if they do, is it possible that we have lost something in the process of defining them?

As 2023 draws to a close, we can celebrate the 52 young women who have been supported with our scholarships since the inception of our foundation in December 2018.

Our Scholars Program continues to grow. The feedback from a survey sent to our recipients indicated their desire for more networking opportunities. In the past year we have set up an exclusive Facebook page, had a coffee morning, a scholars' reception and are planning a half day conference in February 2024.

Thanks to your generous donations last holiday season, we were able to continue to support two young women aging out of care from the CAS, a residence scholarship to Innis College, another student from Iqaluit, as well as adding three more UWC scholarships to our original six, totaling nine of \$6,000 each.

Your committee works diligently throughout the year on your behalf. Our deliberation process is difficult, as all of our applicants are worthy. However, it is also a most rewarding experience. Your committee members are Sharon A., Mary A., Lily C., Susan F., Jane H., Donna H., Susan L., Liz M. and Penny V. When you meet any of these women throughout the year, please thank them.

SPEAKER: MICHELLE HEAD KIM NOVEMBER 13
