



BUSINESS MEETING | NOVEMBER 27 AT 5:30 PM

We have a big night coming up at the end of November. It's a chance for you to get an update from:

- Treasury
- Scholarship
- UWC Foundation

We need your vote. We're looking for your approval on three matters of importance. The first is to approve the transfer of money (\$50,000) from the club accounts to the UWC-Toronto Foundation. The Foundation will use this money to pay out scholarships to girls who are graduating in 2024 from the schools across downtown Toronto; girls in lgaluit who are in university or will be going to university; and girls who are aging out of Children's Aid. We also usually designate \$10,000 as a discretionary amount for causes that come up during the year. For instance, this year we gave \$5,000 to the Canadian Red Cross for earthquake relief in Turkey and Syria. On an entirely different matter, we also have to approve our auditors (Norton McMullen) for the 2024 fiscal year. As we said, we need your vote.

The business meeting will be held on Zoom. A link to the Zoom meeting will be included in the formal Notice of Meeting, which will be sent out to all members shortly. The Notice of Meeting will include a voting proxy form together with instructions on how to fill in the form to allow another member to cast your vote for you if you are unable to attend the meeting and vote yourself.

By holding the meeting on Zoom, we're hoping more people will be able to attend. This is your opportunity to take a closer look at the inner workings of your Club. It will also be a chance to ask any questions you might have.

Hope you will join us on screen on the 27th.

Directors' MESSAGE

From Co-Treasurers Trish S.and Susan L., Directors of UWC's Finance Committee

Overview of Finance Committee:

FINANCE COMMITTEE MOTTO: "A GOAL WITHOUT A PLAN IS SIMPLY A WISH!"

As Co-Treasurers of the Finance Committee, we want to provide you with an overview of our responsibilities. We are privileged to benefit from a dedicated team of Finance Committee members; Pamela Horton, Wendy McCallum, Kathy Nolan-Garner and Barb Edmonds. Our committee plays a critical role in managing and overseeing the club's finances. We ensure transparency and efficiency in budget allocations. Our approach is proactive and collaborative. Monthly meetings are held with our team to discuss both our progress and our strategy. As co-treasurers, we also sit on the Board of Directors and provide them with regular updates.

Our duties involve:

- 1. Budget Management & Communication: We construct a budget in December based on UWC Toronto's goals and priorities. It is presented to the Board for approval. Throughout the year, we monitor our revenue and expenses to ensure our fiscal objectives are met.
- 2. Financial Tracking is done by our Chartered Professional Accountant, Nicole Zerva. However, Finance Committee members review her numerous monthly financial reports via a secure CCH Portal. These reports provide an accurate record of our two investment portfolios' performance, our income and expenses, our bank statements, and various other transactions. This ensures financial transparency and helps to inform our future recommendations to the Board. As co-treasurers, we reach out to Nicole with questions throughout the year.
- 3. Invoices: Expenses that are submitted for payment are carefully reviewed. Most invoices are paid by cheque and require two signatures. Therefore, no automatic payments can go through the club's chequing account. This is a time-consuming exercise that also involves monitoring our bank account balance on an on-going basis.

- 4. Membership Payments: Finance is responsible for tracking all member payments. Renewing members' payments are acknowledged with an e-mail sent from one of our treasurers. Cheques are mailed to our home and deposited promptly. We then correspond with the Membership Committee Team to keep them informed of all renewal payments as well as funds received from new members.
- 5. Monthly Communication & Analysis of key Financial Reports: We summarize financial reports for our Finance Committee team and for the Board of Directors. These reports ensure that the club's financial status and activities are understood and receive proper oversight.
- The club enlists an independent accounting firm to produce our annual Financial Statement and conduct a Review. However, there is usually

conduct a Review. However, there is usually information or documentation required from Finance to complete this task. We also ensure compliance with financial regulations, policies, and guidelines set by our organization.

- 7. Market Updates: We make it a priority to keep abreast of factors that affect our portfolio's performance. These range from employment numbers, direction of interest rates, geo-political developments, the indebtedness of Canadians, inflation numbers etc. We invite Udaya Ratnayake, Senior Portfolio Manager at BMO Nesbitt Burns to speak to our club annually so members may gain insight into his investment strategy and direction. We are in regular contact with Udaya and his team of investment professionals and we attend their annual luncheon to listen to economic experts such as Douglas Porter.
- **8. Collaboration:** Finance works alongside other Directors to align financial decisions with the club's objectives. We set annual goals to help us optimize our resources of both time & money.




MORNING BOOK GROUP | THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 2 AT 10:30 AM ON ZOOM

Below are our book selections for the next three months:


November 2: *Denial* by Beverley McLachlin

From the former Chief Justice of Canada and #1 best-selling author of Full Disclosure comes a new thriller starring tough-as-nails defense attorney Jilly Truitt in a murder case that makes her question her own truths.



December 7: The Mystery of Mrs. Christie by Marie Benedict

In December 1926, Agatha Christie goes missing. Investigators find her empty car on the edge of a deep pond. Her husband and daughter have no knowledge of her whereabouts. Eleven days later she reappears claiming amnesia and providing no explanation for her time away. A master storyteller whose clever mind may never be matched, Agatha Christie's untold story offers perhaps her greatest mystery of all.





January 4: The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

Esme's mother died giving her birth, so she is brought up by her father. She spends her childhood under the table in the Scriptorium, where James Murray and his team of lexicographers, including her father, are Compiling the Oxford English Dictionary. Over time she discovers that words in common use, particularly those used by and about women, are not included. Williams writes that her novel began as two simple questions. Do words mean different things to men and women? And if they do, is it possible that we have lost something in the process of defining them?

Every year, on your behalf, the Scholarship Committee awards not only our UWC Scholarships to deserving young women from local high schools but we also support young women from Iqaluit, a scholar's Residence Scholarship at Innis College and two young women who have aged out of care from the CAS.

Through the generosity of our donors, over 300 scholarships were presented to students for the 2023–24 academic year including 55 first time applicants. And, 99 youth graduated this year. Congratulations to all the amazing students, scholarship recipients and graduates on their success.

"I want to acknowledge each youth in care across Canada and their stories because every one of them is unique, but so often they go unheard. The Foundation helps give us a voice. To my fellow graduates, congratulations. Take pride in the work that has brought you here," – Tiago, valedictorian speaker, former youth in care and youth advocate.

You can understand the need for confidentiality but we can share that this year we have supported these two young women.

T. is beginning her second year in the Social Sciences & Humanities program at the University of Toronto in the fall of 2023. This is our second year of scholarship for T.

M. is beginning her first year in the Veterinary Technology program at the University of Guelph in the fall of 2023.

We have also received letters of thanks and gratitude from our 2022 Innis College Residence Scholarship, Yugin Oh and our 2023 recipient Teni Awoleye.

The UWC of Toronto granted me the incredible opportunity to live at Innis Residence without financial burden during my first year of study. Akin to many small businesses, the pandemic was a difficult time for our family — and the scholarship helped me take a step forward in achieving my academic and personal goals. My name is Tasiana Shirley and I am 17 years-old, afro-indigenous, and born and raised in Iqaluit, Nunavut. I come from a unique background, my father being African-American and Scandinavian, and my mother, an Inuk from Nunavut. Both of my parents work incredibly hard to support me and my aspirations and I am unbelievably grateful for their encouragement. I truly would not be the individual I am today without the integrity, strength, guidance, and utmost inspiration from them both.

In 2019, I was a lead actress in the Indigenous Sci-fi 'Slash/Back' where I worked closely with Indigenous filmmakers, and artists which inspired me to truly embrace my roots from a young age. Since its release, the Slash/Back team and I were privileged with the opportunity of showcasing the film in Canada, Europe, and the US educating others worldwide on Inuit culture. Stemming from my passion for film work, I've also co-lead film workshops designed to guide aspiring Inuit filmmakers and have more recently starred in an Indigenous dystopian short-film!

At school, I am an active member of the Black History Committee, where we focus on advocating Black history and representation, Positive Space Club, where we aim to create a space of equal opportunity, student engagement, and diversity within the school environment. I am also a member of Tusaqtaa (translating to "a place where we all listen" in Inuktitut) Peer Support Group where we incentivize and bring youth together to promote mental wellness in the territory. After high school, I wish to pursue a career as a lawyer and give back to the people and community that have paved my incredible journey.

ROMERO HOUSE FUNDRAISER RECAP OCTOBER 11

We did it! The Romero House fundraiser was a huge success. The numbers aren't all in yet, but we're on track for raising approximately \$10,000 for Romero House!

On the evening of October 11th, the Faculty Club Wedgewood dining room filled to capacity as guests arrived to be greeted by a glass of Prosecco and wandered around the room meeting the founder of Romero House, Mary Jo Leddy and our esteemed key note speaker, Marie Henein. The silent auction table was crowded with excited bidders choosing which of the items they hoped to win and the room was abuzz with excitement and anticipation.

Our first speaker, Paola Gomes spoke of her experience as a refugee coming to Toronto and being helped by Romero House. For her this was a lifesaver and she has gone on to give back to the refugee community over the many years she has lived in Canada. Marie Henein followed with an account from her book on what it was like for her and her family to arrive from the Middle East in this new unfamiliar country. In the Q and A, she spoke brilliantly about the state of our legal system and influences that are changing the system around the world.

The silent auction was then opened up once more and a flourish of final bids were made with the bidding closing at 8:45 pm. The executive director of Romero House, Francesca Allodi-Ross, capped off the evening with an inspiring talk about the incredible work done by her team at Romero House.

This event was a huge success as the room was filled to capacity and the silent auction prizes hit their mark and, in some cases, exceeded expectations.
