MEET MARIE HENEIN - OUR ROMERO HOUSE FUNDRAISER KEYNOTE SPEAKER.

Marie Henein is widely recognized as one of the most prominent criminal defence counsels in Canada. Her name is already familiar to many of us from news articles and media interviews, but did you know that:



- Marie was born in Cairo, Egypt and immigrated with her family to Canada when she was very small;
- Marie's family experienced the dislocation of immigration and resettlement more than once, moving from Cairo to Vancouver to Lebanon to Toronto back to Lebanon and finally returning to Toronto, where they settled in 1970;
- When she started school in Toronto, Marie spoke a mix of Palestinian and Egyptian dialects, but not a word of English;
- Marie has written movingly in her book, Nothing But The Truth, about the tensions felt by many immigrant families: the push towards fitting in with a new culture and the pull from the traditional culture embodied in the close immigrant family.

Don't miss this opportunity to meet and hear one of Canada's top litigators speak about the importance of the immigrant experience in her own life.

Directors' MESSAGE

How fortunate we all are to live in Canada.... To live in a country that is democratic, safe and prosperous.

And how lucky we are to be members of the University Women's Club of Toronto.... To be members of a club where we can have fun playing bridge and mahjongg, and meet in the pub for a glass of wine and a laugh.... And to be able to listen to world class speakers, attend theatre and music events, go to book clubs and French groups and interesting outings all over the city. And how lucky we are to be part of a group that does such good work supporting needy and deserving young women with scholarships to carry on their studies. Yes, we can feel great about our country and our wonderful club and know we are very lucky.

There are many in this city, however, who are not so lucky. I am thinking of newcomers to Canada - especially refugees.

Where do they live? Do they have enough to eat? Do they have warm clothes? Can they speak English?

The answer is they are trying to survive. They have left countries where they were persecuted and threatened often with death to themselves and family, or they lived in a war zone or a disaster zone. For them, coming here, with nothing, is better than the life they left behind.

Luckily, there is Romero House, a tiny organization that does tremendous work with refugees. Last year they housed 184 people including 54 children in transitional and emergency housing.

In many cases staff actually live with the family to help them navigate surviving in this new strange city. On top of this, 744 families were assisted with their walk-in program providing legal aid, lawyer referral, housing help, clothing, Ontario Works, medical appointments, ESL classes, school registration, work permits, food and many other essential services. They work on a shoestring budget where all these extraordinary duties were done for a meager budget of \$852,000 in 2022. Romero House relies on the generosity of the public where 50% of their income is hoped to be donated by the community and friends. It is an uphill battle.

This is why we are holding a fundraising event to support Romero House. We hope you will join us to support our club, as we support Romero House. The event is on Wednesday, October 11 at the Faculty Club. Tickets are only \$75. By buying a ticket you are supporting an organization that does tremendous work to help refugees that come to our country with little more than hope because they cannot remain in their own country.

This Thanksgiving I ask you to think about what you have and why you feel thankful. Then think about what you can do to show your gratitude and give back.

Have a wonderful Thanksgiving, and I look forward to seeing you on October 11th.






MORNING BOOK GROUP THURSDAY, OCTOBER 5 AT 10:30 AM ON ZOOM

October 5: The Silent Patient by Alex Michaelides

The Silent Patient is a shocking psychological thriller of a woman's act of violence against her husband, and of the therapist obsessed with uncovering her motive.



November 2: Denial by Beverley McLachlin

From the former Chief Justice of Canada and #1 best-selling author of *Full Disclosure* comes a new thriller starring tough-as-nails defense attorney Jilly Truitt in a murder case that makes her question her own truths.



December 7: The Mystery of Mrs. Christie by Marie Benedict

In December 1926, Agatha Christie goes missing. Investigators find her empty car on the edge of a deep pond. Her husband and daughter have no knowledge of her whereabouts. Eleven days later she reappears claiming amnesia and providing no explanation for her time away. SPECIAL SPEAKER AND DINNER EVENT SEPTEMBER 11

A special members' event was held on September 11, starting the UWC fall season with a splash. Members old and new got together over complementary glasses of Prosecco to catch up and share news, then sat down to a delicious dinner in the Main Lounge of the Faculty Club.

Dinner was followed by a fascinating presentation by Ariel Siller, CEO of the Canadian Children's Literacy Foundation, and Ariel's colleague, Nina Jobanputra Shukla, the Foundation's Director, Early Words. Members were interested to hear from Ariel and Nina about the current state of children's literacy in Canada. As our speakers pointed out, the years from birth to age five form the most important period for the growth and development of a child's brain. Activities that stimulate literacy in young children, such as reading with them, looking at picture books together, telling stories, singing and talking together, even just handling brightly coloured books and pages, can be fundamental in promoting brain development and laying the foundation for future success in life. It was particularly interesting to hear about the impressive programs set up by the Foundation to encourage literacy and learning among children in remote areas of Canada, and the ways in which the Foundation connects with health care providers to make books available to children and families as part of their routine health care.

A lively question and answer session followed Ariel's and Nina's presentation, with many members recounting how important books and reading have been to them and their families. The evening's combination of a members' gettogether, a dinner and a fascinating guest talk was a great success, and something that we hope to repeat in the future.
